History of the Four Town Fair

The Four Town Fair is considered the oldest continuous Agricultural Fair in Connecticut. It happened in the winter of 1838-1839. People commented: Let's have a contest! People gathered to have their contest; and 420 cows and oxen showed up. Nobody had ever seen so many cows and oxen in one place.

What are the towns in the Four Town Fair? The towns are Enfield, Ellington, Somers, and East Windsor.

Throughout the years, various locations were utilized by the four towns until 1960. The fair society, known as the Union Agricultural Society, purchased land in Somers as the permanent location of all future fairs. In 1964, the Society conducted its first three-day fair so that many more people could attend. Today, crowds are estimated at nearly 20,000 each year.



Directions

From Points North

Travel Route 83 South through Somers Center, turn right onto Field Road and straight onto Egypt Road. Fairgrounds will be on the right-hand side. Parking lots are located on both sides of the road.

From Points South

Travel Route 83 North turning left onto Billings Road and left onto Egypt Road. Fairgrounds will be on the right-hand side. Parking lots are located on both sides of the road

From I-91 and Points West

Traveling I-91, North or South, take Exit 47E for Route 190 East into the Center of Somers. Turn right onto Route 83. Then take first right onto Field Road and straight onto Egypt Road. Fairgrounds will be on the right-hand side. Parking lots are located on both sides of the road.

From Points East

Travel Route 190 West into the Center of Somers, turn left onto Route 83. Take first right onto the Field Road and straight onto Egypt Road. Fairgrounds will be on the right-hand side. Parking lots are located on both sides of the road.

Sunday — Horse Show

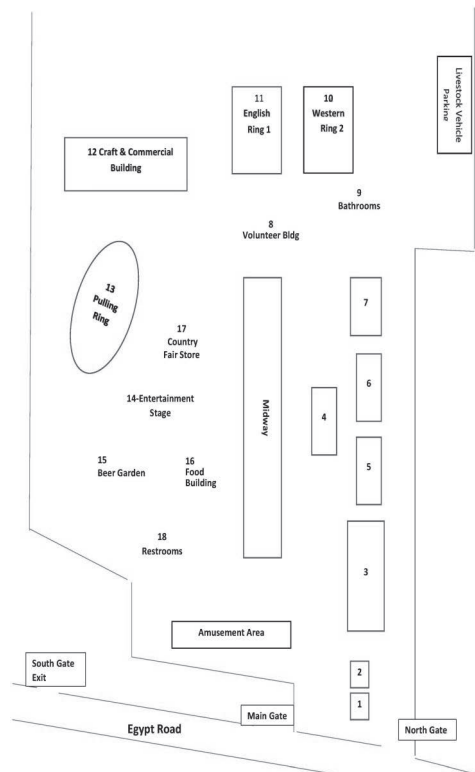
Only vehicles with Horse Trailers will be allowed to enter at the North Gate. All other vehicles must park in Fair Parking Lots.

General Information

Four Town Fair Rules and Regulations

1. Exhibitors must forward a list of their exhibits to the Fair Secretary or Assistant by September 1st. The Fair may refuse any entry that is not in the best interest of the Fair or it deems advisable for health standards. All Pulling Contest, Open Horse Show and Open Oxen may be entered on the day of the show.
2. All exhibitors may purchase an exhibitor's ticket (\$10) from the Secretary at the time of entry and entitles exhibitor entry to the Fair all four days
3. Exhibitors must list all entries on one entry form. Make sure **Dept., Class Numbers, and Lot Numbers** are listed with name of article. Livestock exhibitors see rules and times for entry
4. Exhibitors in Classes 50-66 and Boys & Girls Classes 1-15 & 20 must be brought to Exhibit Hall Wednesday between 2:00 and 8:00 pm **Same day registration not accepted. Articles entered in previous years may not be entered again.** Judging will take place Thursday with only judges and superintendents present. The Exhibit Hall will open Thursday after all judging is completed
5. No entry fees for the following: Oxen, Pony & Horse Pulling, Doodlebug Pulling and Open Oxen Show. Horse & Pony Pulls are allowed one driver and two helpers. All other pulling contest will be allowed one driver and one helper
6. No applicant for any premium shall be entitled to such premium unless said applicant is the owner of the property or article entered at the time of exhibiting same
7. Judges decisions are final. No person shall interfere with judges. Should an exhibitor interfere, his/her exhibit will be disqualified.
8. No person shall be a judge in any class which he/she may be an exhibitor
9. All premiums awarded may be liable to pro-rata reduction sufficient to meet any deficiency that may occur
10. Fruit, Vegetable or Flower Class collections are not eligible for any other premium
11. Only individuals tending their animals will be allowed to remain on the grounds overnight. All others, except Security Police, must leave the grounds at the close of the day's activities
12. No exhibits can be removed before 8:00 pm on Sunday. Exhibits may be picked up Monday from 3-7:00 pm
13. No Premiums will be paid on the dates of the Fair except where otherwise stated
14. All Premiums will be paid after October 31st. Any exhibitor who fails to receive a Premium by November 30th should notify the Treasurer, providing name, address, including zip code
15. Parade uniformed participants will be admitted free to the Fair on Saturday and hand-stamped individuals

16. Any company or firm dealing in agricultural implements or other materials of interest will be allotted spaces for the display of their products upon application to Fair.
17. **No alcoholic beverages permitted on the grounds or parking lots except beer or wine purchased at the Beer Garden.**
18. Parking allowed in designated areas only. Violators will be towed at owner's expense and the Fair Assoc. will not be liable for any damaged incurred
19. Only vehicles pulling trailers with show animals will be allowed access to restricted parking areas
20. Motor homes, trailers, campers and supply trailers are to park in designated areas
21. All Concessionaires must abide by contract Rules and Regulations of the Four Town Fair Association.
22. The **Unions Agricultural Society, Inc. (Four Town Fair)** will not be liable for any of the following: Loss or theft of any articles on exhibit, articles or materials left in automobiles, campers, trucks, etc.; damage to any exhibit, theft of, or damage to, automobiles, trucks, campers, etc., or injuries sustained by any participants in competitive activities
23. **No dogs allowed on the Fairgrounds except for Seeing Eye Guide Dogs**

Connecticut Fair & Livestock Show Regulations 2023

CTAgFairs.org

1. Health certificates signed by an accredited veterinarian and other required testing will be valid for the entire 2023 show season
2. All animals and poultry entered at fairs and shows must be in good health and in proper physical condition and will be examined at the exhibition by the barn superintendent. **Evidence of poor condition or infectious or contagious disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for health certification, vaccination or testing will result in ejection. The Connecticut Department of Agriculture Livestock Inspector's decision is final**
3. Health charts and proof of vaccination where applicable are the responsibility of the exhibitor

4. Barn Superintendents will collect and hold Health Certificates from each exhibitor. Animals not in compliance with the state regulations for shows and fairs will not be allowed. A complete list, containing the name of exhibitor, address, animal ID (ear tag, tattoo, leg band) breed and age of **each** animal, and the total had count will be made available to the State Livestock Inspector and forwarded to the Connecticut Dept of Agriculture, Bureau of Regulations and Inspection by the Fair Superintendent. **All animals and poultry present on the grounds should be identified on this list.** Any animals that is rejected should be noted as such with a brief statement of reason. Rejected animals or poultry should be removed from the grounds as soon as possible. **Any concerns about the health of any animal or bird should be reported to the State Livestock Inspector or the Fair Veterinarian immediately.**
5. Isolate all exhibited animals and poultry upon their return to the farm from other animals and poultry for 3-4 weeks to reduce the risk of disease exposure and transmission. Call your local veterinarian if your animals or poultry become sick to help you with diagnosis and treatment
6. Contact the Bureau of Regulation and Inspection at 860.713.2504 if you have any questions.

Connecticut Animals

All cattle, horses and sheep should have a Rabies vaccination given by a veterinarian. The vaccination certificate must be signed by the veterinarian that gave the vaccination and include the animals identification and description, the name of the vaccine manufacturer, serial number and the date the vaccination was given and when it expires. It is the animals first Rabies vaccination, it must be given at least 30-days prior to their first show date.

1. **All Species:** animals must originate from hers or flocks that meet the testing and health requirements of the State of Connecticut. State livestock inspectors may request proof of compliance with state requirements. No herd or flock under quarantine order shall move or be exhibited. All animals must have permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo, leg band or microchip plus a reader or ELA certificate).
2. **Cattle:** All cattle must have a health certificate issued within 60-days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animal is in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable disease.
3. **Horses:** All horses must have a negative AGID (Coggins) or ELISA test for Equine Infectious Anemia within 12 months of their show date and be accompanied by this certificate. It is highly recommended that horses be vaccinated against EEE & WNV within 6 months of first show date.

4. **Sheep:** All sheep must have official USDA approved identification and be accompanied by health certificates issued within 60-days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating the sheep are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from scrapie exposed flocks
5. **Goats:** All goats must ave official USDA approved identification and a health certificate issued within 60-days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animals are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable disease and are not from scrapie exposed herds
6. **Swine:** All swine must originate from Connecticut herds tested for Brucellosis and Pseudo Rabies on a yearly basis. All swine must have a health certificate issued within 60-days prior to the first show by an accredited veterinarian. If the swine are purchased from a tested herd, a bill of sale from the Connecticut producer must be presented to the State Veterinarian's office before a Connecticut Exhibition Test Card will be issued to the new owner
7. **Poultry:** Poultry originating within the State must come from healthy flocks with no evidence of infectious, contagious and/or communicable dis-eases. All birds must be inspected, identified and be accompa-nied by written proof (Connecticut Flock Test Card or Connecticut Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory Report) that verifies that the breeding flock or the individual birds listed on the report were blood test negative for **Salmonella Pullorum** within 365 days of the show date. Concurrent Avian Influenza testing of the flock and/or individuals birds is strongly recommended. Poultry vac-cinated within 30-days with any live virus vaccine will be prohibited from showing. All cages, crates or vehicles used for housing or transporting poultry must be cleaned and disinfected before and after each show. **Doves, pigeons and waterfowl are exempt from testing requirements, but must be identified by leg bands or wing tags.**
8. **Llamas and Alpacas:** Llamas and alpacas that originate within the State must have a health certificate issued within 60-days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian listing the permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo or microchip and a reader must be available for the microchip) and stating the animal is in good health and free of obvious signs of infectious disease.

Out of State Animals

All cattle, horses and sheep should have a Rabies vaccination given by a veterinarian. The vaccination certificate must be signed by a veterinarian that gave the vaccination and include the animals identification and description, the name of the vaccine manufacturer, serial number and the date the vaccination was given and when it expires. If this is the first Rabies vaccination, it must be given at least 30-days prior to their first show date.

1. **All Species:** Animals shall originate from hers or flocks that meet the testing and health requirements of the State of Connecticut and must be accompanied by health certificates and test charts as indicated below. No animals from a herd or flock under quarantine order shall enter into the State. All animals and poultry must have official permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo, leg band, wing band or microchip plus a reader, or EIA certificate). **All animals and birds (except horses) must have an exhibition permit number on the health certificate. Call 860.713.2504 or 860.713.2505 for a permit number. All out of state animals and birds offered for sale must meet Connecticut Importation Regulations.**
2. **Cattle:** All cattle must have health certificates issued within 30-days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian, test charts and vaccination certificates where applicable. All cattle must have a negative TB test within 12-months of the show date. Cattle under 6-months of age may go on the dam's TB test chart if the dam was tested for TB within the past 12-months and a copy of the results are provided. All Brucellosis vaccinated female cattle over 18-months of age and all bulls and non-vaccinated female cattle 6-months of age and older must have a negative Brucellosis test within 12-months of the show date. Steers and spayed heifers are exempt from Brucellosis testing
3. **Horses:** All horses must have a health certificate issued within 30-days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian. All horses must have a negative AGID (Coggins) or ELISA test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within 12-months of the show date and be accompanied by this certificate. It is highly recommended that horses be vaccinated against EEE and WNV within 6-months of the first show date.
4. **Sheep:** All sheep must have official USDA approved identification and be accompanied by health certificates issued within 30 -days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian stating that the sheep are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from scrapie exposed flocks.

5. **Goats:** All goats must have official USDA approved identification and be accompanied by a health certificate issued within 30-days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian stating that the goats are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from scrapie exposed flocks. All goats must originate from Brucellosis and TB free herds. Goats over 3- months old must test negative to TB and Brucellosis within 12-months of the show date. Kids under 3-months of age may go on the dam's test chart if the dam was tested within the past 12-months and a copy of the results is provided. Wethers are exempt from Brucellosis testing.
6. **Swine:** Swine that are 3-months of age and older must be negative to Brucellosis and Pseudo Rabies test and have a health certificate stating such within 30-days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian. Barrows are exempt from Brucellosis testing but must have a negative Pseudo Rabies test. Swine under 3-months of age must originate from a Brucellosis free and Pseudo Rabies qualified herd and the herd test date and qualified herd numbers must be on the health certificate.
7. **Poultry:** All poultry must be identified and test negative for Salmonella Pullorum within 12-months of the show date and be accompanied by this certificate. All poultry must comply with the Department of Agriculture Avian Influenza requirements by originating from AI-Free flocks or be tested for AI within 30-days of entry and have a certificate. No poultry from any areas of any state having Avian Influenza may enter Connecticut. Poultry vaccinated within 30-days with any live virus vaccine will be prohibited from showing. All cages, crates and vehicles used for housing and transporting poultry must be cleaned and disinfected before and after each show. **Doves, pigeons and waterfowl are exempt from testing requirements, but must be identified by leg bands or wing tags.**
8. **Llamas and Alpacas:** All llamas and alpacas must have a negative Axillary TB test within 12-months and a negative Brucellosis test within 12-months of entry, and a health certificate issued within 30-days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian, listing the permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo or microchip and a reader must be available for the microchip) and test results.

Important Notice

All animals for which there is a licensed Rabies vaccine—cattle, horses, sheep, dogs, cats, and ferrets—exposed to the public should be vaccinated against Rabies. Animals not having an approved Rabies vaccination should be displayed in a manner such that the public would not be in contact or exposed to saliva from those animals and have **Easily Visible Posted Signs or Tape stating 'Connecticut Rabies Advisory Notice — Do Not Feed or Touch Animals'**

On August 04, 2008, the Department of Agriculture adopted regulations for the 'Control of Rabies in Public Settings' which will be enforced at all Connecticut fairs and public exhibitions. The complete text of the regulations RCSA SS22-359-1 — 22-359-5, follows this notice.

Its provisions include the following for both Connecticut and Out of State Animals:

1. **Animals for which there is a licensed Rabies Vaccine —** Horses, cattle, sheep, dogs, and cats must be currently vaccinated against Rabies by a licensed veterinarian unless they are under the minimum age to be vaccinated. (Ferrets are also included in this category if displayed). These animals must have a rabies vaccination certificate signed by the licensed veterinarian administering the vaccine that includes the animals ID and description, name and address of owner, name of the vaccine manufacturer, serial number, date the vaccination was administered and date when it expires. If it is the animals first vaccination, it must be given at least 30-days prior to the first show date to be considered current
2. **Animals not having an approved Rabies vaccination —** Includes animals for which there is not a licensed Rabies vaccine and animals for which there is a licensed Rabies vaccine but are under the age to be vaccinated (Most Rabies vaccines are labeled to be administered when animals reach 3-months of age—young animals for exhibition should be vaccinated as soon as possible after 3-months of age — Animals must be separated from the public to avoid direct contact with people and other animals (double fence, plexiglass or other means) and conspicuous signs posted stating '**Connecticut Rabies Advisory Notice — Do not Feed or Touch Animals'**

Yellow tape with the Rabies advisory notice wording is available for purchase from the Dept of Agriculture. Contact the Dept at 860.713.2504 if you have any questions regarding the requirements, regulations or obtaining the Rabies Advisory Notice Tape.

Rules:

1. Any Boy or Girl who is 5 years old and under sixteen years of age as of October 1st will be eligible to compete for premiums in this department unless otherwise stated.
2. All exhibits must have been grown or produced by the Boy or Girl exhibiting the same and must be their own Bonafede property. **Any article entered any previous year may not be entered again.** No exhibit shown in a collection will be eligible for any other premium offered.
3. All exhibits must be properly tagged, giving name, address and age. **Please cover name for judging.** Judging will be Thursday.
4. Exhibitors must provide their own tools and all other things needed for arranging, holding, and displaying exhibit
5. **All exhibits must be brought in Wednesday between 2:00 and 8:00 pm Exhibits may only be picked up Sunday from 7:15-8:15 pm or Monday between 3:00 and 7:00 pm**

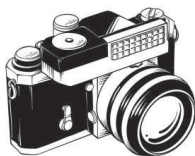

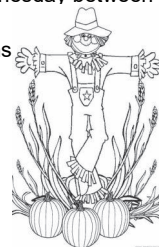

New England Doodlebug Association Rules

1. All machines will be of the four wheel design, two rear wheel drive only. The use of industrial/agricultural parts is prohibited, only truck and/or automotive parts may be used with two transmissions and/or adequate gearing. No automatic transmissions. Frame rails must consist of at least 70% truck or automotive frame.
2. No tires larger than 18.90x24.50 will be permitted, except for LT only 15.00x16.5 commercial, military, or industrial tread with no chains on any tire. No studded tires on drive wheels. No agricultural and/or tractor type tread. No steel belted radial tires on the drive axle (steel belted radials will be permitted on the steer axle). Original tire size shall be legible on the tire.

Safety Requirements

1. Two wheel brakes, operated by a foot pedal. Driveline brakes are unacceptable
2. Exhaust system must extend over the drivers head and be securely attached with minimal leakage
3. Suitable metal firewall between engine and driver
4. Hood made of metal or fiberglass securely attached to the firewall
5. One fuel tank with a leak-free system, securely mounted behind the firewall. Metal or approved plastic tanks only, with a maximum capacity of ten gallons
6. Batteries shall be securely mounted in front of the firewall or opposite the fuel tank
7. A suitable guard shall be in place over any belts and/or pulleys
8. Universal joints must be wrapped in a suitable material i.e., rubber, duct tape and/or metal shielding (fully enclosed). Any driveshaft over two feet in length must have a restraint at both ends.
9. Guards must be in place over any and all drive chains
10. All axle nuts and Dayton lugs must be covered with a suitable material (rubber or duct tape) no metal bug covers
11. All lock rings on drive wheels must be mounted to the inside. Split wheels are not allowed. All non-factory welded wheels will have ribs not less than 1/4x2". Ribs must cover seventy-five percent of wheel width. Botl together wheels must have a minimum of two rods not less than 3/4" diameter (no threaded rod). Both rods and ribs shall join inside and outside wheel halves
12. Push-pull or toggle ignition kill switch within drivers reach shall be well labeled and painted red. All first year drivers must have a kill switch with a tether attached that is in reach of pit crew personnel, preferably on the left side, below the drivers' seat
13. All machines shall have an adequate seat with a back and padding
14. The use of antifreeze in the machine's cooling system is prohibited
15. No rigid suspension on front axle
16. No cabs
17. Pulling change—Class I: 3/8" minimum; Class II and III: 1/2" minimum, all chains shall be a minimum Grade 7
18. No machine shall have a rear axle designed to life the stone oat
19. Steel hitches may be used

Drawing Procedures

1. Machines will be driven in an orderly manner without excessive spinning of wheels. Machines shall be in neutral while hitching and unhitching
2. No tightening of hitches with any device, including hammering
3. All drivers and helpers shall not have or consume alcoholic beverages before or during the contest. Publicly accepted language only
4. Additional weight may be added up to class limits as long as it is securely mounted. Filled tires (water only) are permitted
5. The top three machines to place in each class may be reweighed after each class, with an official present, if a scale is available. Machine must be within fifty pounds of its weight class or it will be disqualified
6. The stone boat shall be moved three feet, in a continuous motion, for a 'full pull'
7. Machines shall not draw more than once in each rotation. The last machine in rotation will go around when necessary
8. Time limit to be set at each contest. The time shall start when the driver signals and is acknowledged by the announcer
9. Any machine arriving late may pull in its class, providing no one in that class has dropped out
10. Machine tires will not touch or cross the end lines while hooked to the stone boat. Driver must signal for time to stop, at which time the stone boat may be repositioned by a machine in the same rotation, or the machine will be around and the drivers time will then resume
11. **The decision of the superintendent is final**

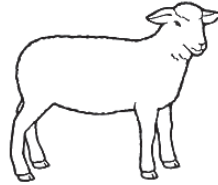

State Adult Baking Contest—Class 65 Lot 82

Pane Bianco

Ingredients

- 3 cups King Arthur Baking Co All-Purpose Flour
- 2 teaspoons instant yeast
- 1 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 large egg
- 1/2 cup water, lukewarm
- 1/4 cup water, lukewarm
- 3 tablespoons olive oil

Filling

- 1/2 cup shredded Fontina cheese
- 1/4 cup shredded Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 cup oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes
- 3 garlic cloves, peeled and minced
- 1 1/2 tablespoons dried basil

Instructions

1. To make the dough: Measure the flour and gently spoon it into a cup, then sweep off any excess. Combine all of the dough ingredients in a bowl, then mix and knead to make a smooth, very soft dough
2. Place the dough in a lightly greased bowl, cover, and let it rise until it is doubled in size, about 45 to 60 minutes
3. Meanwhile, thoroughly drain the tomatoes, patting them dry. Use kitchen shears or a sharp knife to cut them into smaller bits
4. Place the dough on a lightly floured surface and pat or roll into 22" x 8 1/2" rectangle, deflating it slightly. Spread with the cheese, tomatoes, garlic, and basil
5. Starting with one long edge, roll the dough into a log the long way. Pinch the edges to seal. Place the log seam-side down on a lightly greased or parchment-lined baking sheet
6. Using kitchen shears, start 1/2" from one end and cut the log lengthwise down the center about 1" deep, to within 1/2" of the other end
7. Keeping the cut side up, form an 'S' shape, Tuck both ends under the center of the 'S' to form a 'figure 8'; pinch the ends together to seal. When shaping the loaf, tuck any larger pieces of tomato or basil down into the dough (to avoid char).
8. Cover and let rise in a warm place until double, 45 to 60 minutes
9. While the loaf is rising, preheat the oven to 350 degrees F.
10. Uncover the bread, and bake it for 35—40 minutes, tenting it with foil after 20—25 minutes to prevent over-browning
11. Remove the bread from the oven and transfer it to a rack to cool

- 3/4 cup white sugar
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 egg
- 2 teaspoons lemon zest
- 1 1/2 cups plus 1 tablespoon King Arthur Baking Flour divided

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk

7. Fold the blueberries into the batter
8. Spread the batter evenly in the prepared pan
9. For the topping, combine the butter, brown sugar, white sugar, flour, and cinnamon together in a small bowl until a crumbly mixture forms
10. Sprinkle the topping mixture over the batter in the pan
11. Bake until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, about 40-45 minutes
12. Once cooled, cut into 9 equal pieces

Lemon Bliss Cake

Ingredients

Cake

16 tablespoons unsalted butter at room temperature
2 cups granulated sugar
1 teaspoon salt
4 large eggs room temperature
2 teaspoons baking powder
3 cups King Arthur All Purpose Flour
1 cup milk
Zest of 2 lemons
1/4 cup King Arthur Almond Flour for dusting baking pan (Optional)

Glaze

1/3 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice; about 1 1/2 lemons
3/4 cup granulated sugar

Icing

1 1/2 cups confectioners sugar
Pinch of salt
2 to 3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F
2. Beat together butter, sugar, and salt until combined then until fluffy and lightened in color.
3. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Scrape the sides and bottom of the bowl once all the eggs have been added, and beat briefly to re-combine
4. Measure the flour by gently spooning it into a cup, then sweeping off any excess. Whisk the baking powder into the flour. Add the flour mixture to the batter in three parts alternately with the milk, starting and ending with the flour-Mix until everything is well combined; the batter will look a bit rough, but should not have any large lumps. Stir in the zest
5. Thoroughly grease a 10 to 12 cup Bundt pan. Spoon the batter into the prepared pan leveling it and smoothing the top with a spatula
6. Bake for 45 to 60 minutes or until a cake tester or toothpick comes out clean.
7. While the cake is baking, make the glaze by stirring together the lemon juice and sugar. Microwave or heat over a burner briefly, stirring to dissolve the sugar. You do not want to cook the lemon juice, so microwave just until very warm, less than 1 minute—set glaze aside
8. Remove the cake from oven, place the pan upside down on a cooling rack
9. Brush the glaze all over the hot cake, both top and sides. Let it sink in, then brush on more glaze continuing until all the glaze is used up
10. Allow the cake to cool completely before icing and serving
11. To ice the cake, mix the sugar and salt, then mix in 2 tablespoons of the lemon juice, adding just enough additional juice to create a thick glaze, one that is just barely pourable. Drizzle it artfully over the completely cook cake
12. Submit covered with plastic wrap and on a disposable plate

Banana Chocolate Chip Muffins

Ingredients

- 8 tablespoons unsalted butter—room temperature
- 2/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup bananas, about 2 medium or 1 1/2 large bananas mashed
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/8 to 1/4 teaspoon butter-rum flavor or coconut extract—optional
- 1/3 cup milk
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup King Arthur All Purpose Flour
- 1 cup King Arthur White Whole Wheat Flour
- 3/4 cup chocolate chips
- 1 cup chopped walnut pre-toasted in a 350 degree oven for 8 minutes
- 1 cup cinnamon chips, optional but tasty

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly grease 12 to 14 standard muffin cups. You'll use the larger number of cups if you include the full amount of all three add-ins: chocolate chips, walnuts, and cinnamon chips
2. In a medium sized mixing bowl or the bowl of your stand mixer, beat together the butter and sugar till smooth
3. Beat in the mashed banana, then the egg, flavorings, and milk
4. Add the baking powder, baking soda, salt, and flours, stirring till smooth; if the mixture has a lot of lumps, beat at a higher speed until they've nearly disappeared
5. Stir in the chocolate chips, walnuts, and cinnamon chips
6. Heap the thick batter into the prepared muffin cups, mounding them quite full; a muffin scoop works well here. Sprinkle the tops of the muffins with coarse white sparkling sugar, if desired
7. Bake the muffins for 20 to 23 minutes, until a cake tester inserted into the center of one of the middle muffins in the pan comes out clean
8. Remove the muffins from the oven, and tilt them in the pan to cool a bit; this will prevent their bottoms from becoming soggy. As soon as you can safely handle them, transfer the muffins to a rack to cool completely
9. Submit 6 muffins on a disposable plate

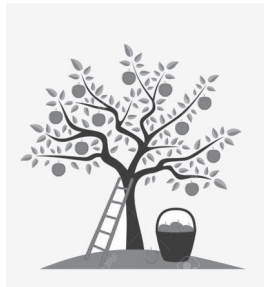

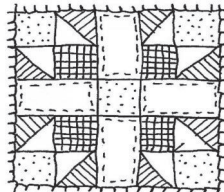
